Glossary of terms:

A guide to understand your impact report

CONTRIBUTED CAPITAL

The original amount invested by the donor to establish an endowed fund.

CONSUMER PRICE INDEX (CPI)

A measure that examines the weighted average of prices on a variety of consumer goods. Changes in CPI are used to assess price changes associated with the cost of living.

ENDOWED PORTION

Includes the total of all gifts directed to be invested in the endowment and the accumulated interest returns, less the total amount allocated for spending since account inception.

SEGREGATED CAPITAL

Accumulated investment returns of the endowed portion, less the amount allocated for spending to support the purpose of the fund.

SPENDABLE PORTION

Represents the spending allocation provided from the endowment, as well as any funds from other sources given to support the present needs of the fund.


LONG-TERM INVESTMENT POOL

Holds investments that have a higher risk tolerance. There is some liquidity required to allow for purchases and sales, but the asset mix is more equity-based. Funds invested include endowments, funds functioning as endowments, and other funds that are not expected to be spent for at least five years. The objective of the pool is to produce an annualized rate of return of four per cent in excess of CPI.

USASK ENDOWMENT INVESTMENT PRACTICES

The University of Saskatchewan invests endowments in a pooled fund (called the Long Term Pool) with a long-term return objective of the Consumer Price Index (CPI) plus 4% to grow the donation and provide spendable funds guided by the endowment's terms.

The Long Term Pool is comprised of fixed income, equities and alternatives spread across 10 managers with diversified strategies. Ten-year performance is charted below against the benchmarks and ten-year annualized return of 7.6%.



The allocation of spendable funds from the endowment is set at 3.75% of the endowment value and is increased annually by a factor equal to CPI. The spending rate is reviewed periodically to ensure stable annual funding to support donor-specified priorities and that the purchasing power is preserved for future generations.
